Grant secures VIC future

THE future of VIC has been secured thanks to a Ministry of Defence Armed Forces Covenant Fund Trust grant of £46,725.

VIC was one of just 13 organisations country-wide to be awarded a grant under the 'Sustaining Support programme' core track Round 2

This latest grant, in addition to the charity being awarded a further two years of funding from the East Lancashire Clinical Commissioning Group in April, ensures that outreach across the VIC areas of East Lancashire and Heywood, Middleton and Rochdale is secure.

Chief Executive Amanda Walton said: "This grant will help to fund core staff within our organisation so they can continue delivering the service to former Armed Forces personnel who need it.

"The funding will also allow VIC to provide greater support to our volunteers, who will be upskilled which will make the organisation more sustainable beyond the life of the grant.

"VIC will be offering volunteers the chance to undertake training so they

can help with benefits and housing, learn more about mental health and receive first aid training.

"They will be able to attend suicide awareness courses as well as specialised training to aid the individual's own progression.

"This grant will be used to empower the volunteers who have come through VIC as part of a peer support model and this in turn will help the core staff to continue with the level of service they already deliver."

Throughout the pandemic, VIC staff never stopped working, provided continuous care calls and no one was furloughed.

Amanda said: "I am so proud of the way everyone has dealt with what has been a really difficult time.

"We have now restarted all of our activities and in fact have extended our provision to include Blackburn and opened up a new coffee morning in Ribble Valley.

"We are going from strength to strength and, with the additional new funding and security that it brings, we are hoping to set up new projects in 2022 in accordance with what our members are telling us they want and would like to see."



Memorial benches



STUNNING hardwood Remembrance benches have been created by a veteran as a way of thanking VIC for its help.

Royal Navy veteran diver David Green sought help from VIC when he was going through a dark time after a difficult break up.

David, from Rawtenstall, followed in his mother and father's footsteps when he joined the Navy in 1984, just after the Falklands War, and he served for seven years.

He said: "In 2019, I was poorly and I was at an all-time low. I went to VIC and asked for help. I was dealing with lots of traumas and needing to use food banks, but VIC has helped me massively.

"This community that VIC has created is priceless; an invisible shield for when you're down and feel



beat."

David, who is supported through the Building Better Opportunities, Changing Futures Project, said he received help from VIC's Transformational Coach Gill Hughes, Chief Executive Amanda Walton and latterly Veterans' Mental Health Caseworker Cath Mitton.

The charity had been donated vintage cast iron bench ends and David, together with VIC member Graham Limb.

organised a project to create the benches, assisted by North Lancs Training Group student Bailey Ralphs who is volunteering with VIC.

David said: "We got the ends professionally acid dipped and then black power coated and went to North West Timber Treatments in Waterfoot to get the best Sapele wood for the slats and advice on how to treat them."

He then sought the best products to stain and treat the wood and



Fletchers in Waterfoot provided the necessary products at a very reasonable rate.

David said: "Making the benches has helped me because it stopped me thinking about the problems in my life and gave me a purpose – to do something constructive and to say thank you to a service that helped me at my lowest point."

Volunteer veteran Graham Limb said: "It has been a labour of love. We took everything to the basement of the VIC drop in and shop in Accrington's Arndale as there was lots of room for us to make the benches.

The charity had enough bench ends to make five high quality benches and each can be fitted with a personally inscribed plaque and is being sold for £600 each.

Roland, 93, joined up in 1947 and served for six years initially in the Border Regiment, then Manchester Regiment and finally Kings Liverpool.

He worked on transport, was a dispatch rider and drove Bedford QL lorries serving three years in Berlin.

Roland said: "I have been coming to VIC for about five years and I have met quite a few people.

"It is nice to come here on a Thursday afternoon and have a good chat to everyone and we have made quite a few friends."
