## A fitting farewell to D-Day hero

**VETERANS and serving soldiers stood shoulder-to-shoulder to say a final farewell to D-Day veteran Jack Riley, three days after what would have been his 100th birthday.**

VIC Piper Steve Sumner led the Standard Bearers and Jack's hearse past a guard of honour of more than 60 people, both veterans and serving personnel, which formed at the entrance to Accrington Crematorium.

There was standing room only inside for his service.

Jack, 99, died peacefully on December 28 at Highfield Hall Care Home, he had previously lived in Central Flats in Haslingden and had been a member of VIC for seven years.

Jack chose to join up in 1942, even though, as a plumber, he was in a 'reserved occupation' so exempt from conscription.

After completing Infantry training, the new soldiers were in Stalybridge, Tameside, when officers came in and asked if anyone could use a spanner, everyone who raised their hands, which included Jack, then became founding members of the newly formed corps the Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineers.

On June 6 1945, Jack

was in one of the last waves of soldiers to be sent across the channel to the Normandy Beaches.

He was interviewed in 2022 when he received the Legion d'Honneur, the highest military medal from France,

Jack described what it was like on the landing craft. He said: "It wasn't rough or anything like that... but the spray was the biggest thing, with it having a flat front it would dip and [the spray] covered you. I was on the scared side, but I wasn't showing it and I think everyone was in the same boat.

"They were wondering and saying, 'I wonder if it will be a wet landing, up to here', (indicating to his neck) because we had heard about things before; being in four foot of water, they weren't fit to fight by

the time they got ashore, they needed to dry out.

"I had never swam with kit on and some drowned. I was fortunate really. The hardship was nowt to do with the enemy or that, but we had to go about in bare feet when we were in the fields so we didn't leave traces and it was like walking on needles. We had to put our boots under our arms."

At his funeral, Celebrant Sarah Flanagan talked not only of Jack's war record, he spent five years in the forces, but also of his life as a son, husband, father, grandfather and great-grandfather.

He met his future wife Brenda after he broke his leg and while in a military hospital, the soldier in the next bed was from Colne. He had two daughters and asked Jack to become a

penpal to one of them. A year after being demobbed, they married.

After service, he first worked as a driver for Hollands Pies for many years and latterly would visit schools to talk of his wartime experiences mending military vehicles on the front line.

VIC Project Worker Ray Sharkey said: "Jack would often walk across to the VIC Centre and share a cup of tea and a doughnut while the veterans in attendance listened to him spellbound and stunned that he was there for some of the most pivotal events of the Second World War..

"As a student of history, I felt honoured to know Jack as a friend and living legend, the like of which this generation can only aspire to be."

# Book sheds light on SAS

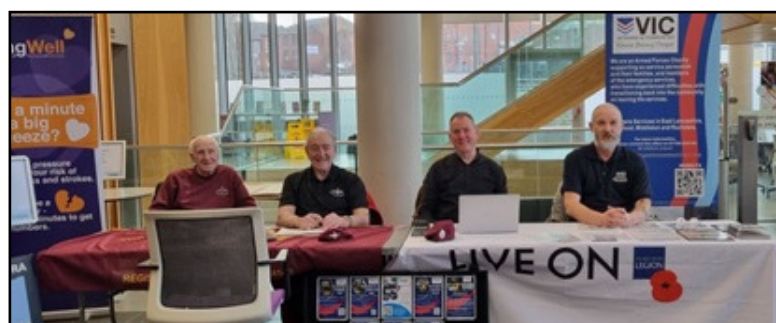
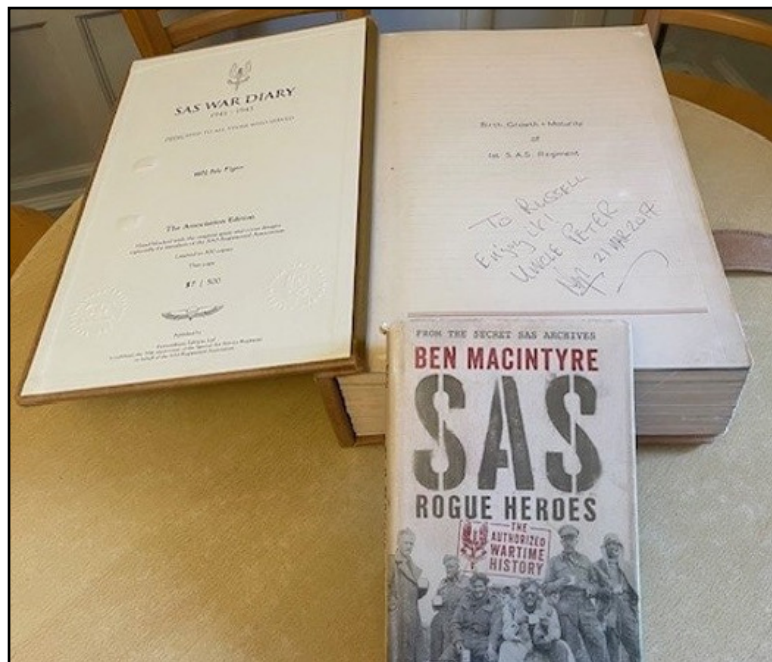
VIC has been fortunate to have been loaned a copy of the original SAS War Diary, which was used as the foundation for the TV drama series for **Rogue Heroes**.

**TWO free photography talks will be delivered by Duncan Phillips at the VIC Centre, Haslingden in February.**

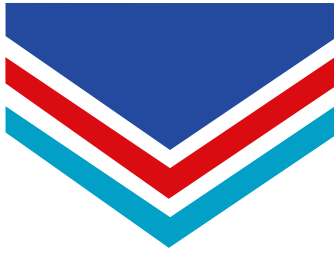
Duncan is one of our members from Clitheroe, and he owns Knowle Top Gallery in Clitheroe.

During Covid, Darren's animal paintings were raffled off to help keep zoos going when they were unable to open.



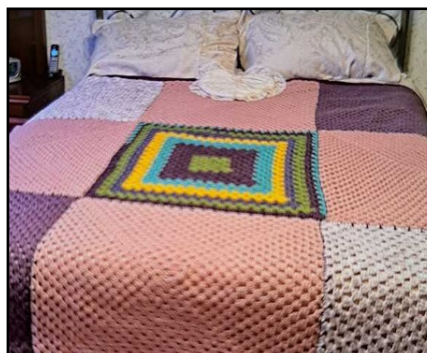

# VIC highlights 2023

## REFERRALS

We saw an increase in referrals from the previous year, especially for support with re-housing, benefits, mental health, local housing teams and general information about other welfare issues and enquires. Our outreach venues in Accrington, Clitheroe, Haslingden, Heywood, and Middleton had a regular number attending each week and many participated in the other social inclusion and outreach services across the year.

## ACTIVITIES

*Core activities continued: Arts and Crafts groups, Social Trips, Social Inclusion Activities, Walks, Model Railway Club, and the Choir. An additional Bimble walking group was started for those unable to take part in the more physically demanding walks.*

## CENTRE USERS

The VIC Centre has an average of 500 members, partner organisations, and member drop-ins each month seeking support or to see the services that utilise our centre.

## OUTREACH

*Across the year, our outreach team has given information, advice and support on a range of issues including benefits, re-housing, employment, courses, welfare support, referrals, telephone enquiries and our current membership is around 700 enrolled veterans or family members. Many had multiple issues and involved referrals being made to other statutory and third sector*

*organisations.*

## PARLIAMENT

VIC Centre had a visit from Penny Mordaunt MP (Lord President of the Council and Leader of the House of Commons) and Sara Britcliffe MP for Hyndburn and Haslingden to see what VIC does to support the Armed Forces Community. After the visit, we were mentioned not once but twice in the Houses of Parliament on May 10.

## FILM

*The film we made for the 'The Stories In Transition' project was officially launched at the National Army Museum in June. We will organise a North-West showing in 2024.*

## BBO FINISHES

The 'Building Better Opportunities' programme came to an end in March and VIC overachieved the targets set by European Social Fund.

## INFO STANDS

*Our outreach team held a number of information stands across our operating areas, these included mental health events, health centres, and volunteer events. They briefed DWP staff about veterans, issues they may have and different ways of supporting them.*

## ALLOTMENT

The VIC allotment was managed by a new member in 2023 and over the 12 months he has transformed it into a working allotment which has become a haven for wildlife.

## VPPP

*The Veterans' Places, Pathways and People, VPPP, programme we have been working on, came to an end in December. Partners are currently working on the legacy*

*of this successful programme using what we've learnt to provide safe places for veterans to access.*

## SUPPORTING OTHERS

We were contacted by three North-West based veteran-led third sector organisations who asked for our support in funding applications and also ways of setting up a similar provision to VIC in Warrington, Preston and Morecambe.

## WORK EXPERIENCE

*We supported learners on work experience from North Lancs Training. One of these learnt a range of social and general building maintenance skills. During the placement, he made the decision to join the Army and, if all goes well, he will be starting his basic training in early 2024.*

## 100TH BIRTHDAY

VIC members celebrated the 100th birthday of one of the Sandbag Café members WW2 veteran Bernard Munton.

## REME VETERAN

*We reunited one of our WW2 veterans Jack Riley with the Royal Electrical Mechanical Engineers (REME). He was one the first to join the REME in 1942 and the Association spent time with him to talk about experiences. The techniques are still used today, and his experiences have been documented.*

## OPEN DAY

An open day at Accrington Veterans' Drop-in yielded a great response and around 50 people attended. We invited the Hyndburn Deputy Mayor Councillor Terry Hurn and the Mayoress his wife Jean. We had some great feedback, they saw the Model Railway Club and heard about how the drop-in makes a difference to veterans' lives.

## PEEL TOWER ABSEIL

*In March we held a challenge where we had a number of our members and supporters abseil down the Peel Tower to raise money for VIC.*

## CORONATION

We opened the VIC Centre in Haslingden for members to celebrate the King's Coronation. They were able to watch the Coronation and parade on TV, have something to eat from a buffet and spend the morning and afternoon with other members who would have been at home on their own. It was a great day and good company.

## SOCIAL TRIPS

*VIC organised a good selection of social inclusion trips for our members. These included Carnforth Heritage Centre, Heskin Hall, Leyland Commercial Vehicle Museum, Hot Ice Show in Blackpool, Whitehough Outdoor Education, Centre, Bolton Abbey and steam train, Whalley Hall and the Ridges Gardens. All these trips were full.*

## CAKE STALL

We had another cake stall at the Rawtenstall Vintage and Craft Fair at the Unitarian Church in Rawtenstall. Our members contributed with a selection of homemade cakes, and these were sold to raise £215 for VIC.

## EQUINE THERAPY

*One of the members of the Model Railway Club got involved in Adventure Neighbourhood on an equine therapy course. A new project he got involved in was to train horses to find objects and people through scent. This is a unique concept and is having some good successes.*

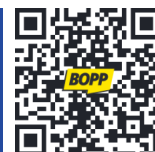
