Poignant acts of Remembrance

REMEMBRANCE projects at Bacup Cemetery and Whitworth Memorial Gardens have been completed in time for the Armistice commemoration next month.

VIC has worked with a number of local groups including Community Payback, the Prince's Trust and local Beavers and Cubs to rebuild a wall, plant a willow tank and soldier and sew poppies in Whitworth and properly recognise the graves of First World War Soldiers in Bacup Cemetery.

Now our members are preparing to attend services across the region to pay their respects for those who fell in two world wars and numerous conflicts. One veteran is

even going to The Falklands for the Remembrance service at Port Stanley.

Another member Peter Webster, who masterminded the Bacup Cemetery War Graves 100 Project, has been asked by VIC trustee David Peat to play the Last Post at St Peter's Church, in Simonstone, on November 8th. Peter was a military musician.

Manager Bob Elliott said: "There is a particular poignancy to this year's remembrance services because it is the centenary of start of the First World War.

"It is documented that there are 677 service men buried in the many cemeteries in Rossendale with many more being laid to rest on



foreign soil where they fell.

"We know there are many, many more because when we began the Bacup project we were told of 109 graves, and we completed installing the plinths there were 119. We will remember them."

On Sunday November

2nd, at The Riverside in Whitworth, VIC Singing Group and Fitton Factor Community Choir from Oldham will be performing together in Rossendale's Festival of Remembrance Service. Tickets are £5.

VETERAN Dave Almond had devised his own therapy to cope with the after effects of a brain haemorrhage - he creates stunning bespoke walking

The snake sticks, called Mv-Stic. are all individually hand-crafted by recycling walking sticks he picks up at car boot sales and charity shops; no two are the same.

Dave, 49, has recently joined VIC where he is making use of our arts and crafts room and once the workshop is built in the rear yard he will be teaching others how to carve the sticks.

He said: "I joined the RAF Regiment in 1982 and suffered a brain haemorrhage in 1985 when I was in Germany. I had been training too hard.

"This left me in rehabilitation for a year or so at Headley Court."

He was a Senior Aircraftsman and although he fought himself back to fitness. because of the brain injury he was not allowed to return to action and spent the last 18 months of service taking reconnaissance photographs.

His experiences left him with weakness in his right side and Post-



Dave said: "I managed everything and was working in security until in 1998 I thought I had slipped a disc and I found I had damaged my back. "I was having

Dave, from Accrington, kept on being stopped by people while he walked around the town and they



a relapse, which further eradicated his motor skills, making the need for therapy even more vital.

So he began making the sticks, because it helped him maintain movement in his hand. He was recommended to join VIC to help with his recovery.

"Coming to VIC has really helped me." he said. "As a veteran, when you talk to some civilian therapists they do not understand what you are talking about. They do not understand our language.

"At VIC everyone understands each other because they are ex-forces. We speak the same language and we all help each other out."

Dave is a reiki master and so every My-Stic has crystals inserted into the eyes and mouth of the snake.

Dig deep for VIC

MEMBERS are enjoying digging for victory in Haslingden and the fruits of their labours will be available for all to enjoy.

VIC received a Social Prescribing grant from the East Lancashire CCG to develop the area at the rear of our Haslingden premises.

The 'Dig for VIC' project has now begun in earnest and the ground has been prepared ready for the first stage of the project construction of a shed and workshop.

The workshop will be used initially to manufacture furniture for the back garden as well as becoming a social enterprise project.

VIC members will construct the whole project including creating raised beds, planters and putting in a greenhouse to grow plants and vegetables for veterans.

The workshop will be fitted with a range of tools and equipment to manufacture different products that will be sold to the public and will provide a base for future community activities VIC will be involved in.

New family support services

FAMILY support services are now being offered throughout Rossendale and Rochdale.

VIC Outreach and Community Development Worker Suzanne Preston said: "VIC offers support to the families of serving and exservice personnel, which includes partners and their parents.

"We also work with members of the other uniformed

emergency services as they can experience similar difficulties.

"Many armed services families suffer from marital and family breakdown and one of the services the family support group provides is information and advice on single parenting issues.

"Another is support for parents of veterans who find themselves having to return to the parental home or having

to rely on their family to support them during some difficult times."

"There are regular meetings throughout our outreach areas, regular events and activities and we have set up a separate closed Facebook group for those who use social media."
